Welcome Letter 2025

DEAR INCOMING STUDENT:

Congratulations on your acceptance and decision to begin SIT's Doctoral Program in Sustainability this summer! I would once again like to welcome you into the doctoral program—a significant next step in your academic, personal, and professional development and career. The entire SIT Graduate Institute faculty and staff looks forward to supporting you throughout this gratifying journey. I'd also like to take this opportunity to share some important information about the program and to answer some of your questions regarding what to expect. This letter contains important information about your upcoming semester, residency, and subsequent studies and should prove useful as you prepare for the program.

YOUR FACULTY

My name is **Joe Lanning**, and I am the Ph.D. Program Chair and Associate Professor of Sustainable Development Practice at SIT. I hold a doctorate in ecological and environmental anthropology from the University of Georgia and an M.A. in global history from the University of Rochester. I am an educator, practitioner, and researcher active in sustainable development and food systems, with a regional focus on southern Africa. My research focuses on the mixed livelihoods of rural Malawians as they navigate climatic, environmental, and economic risk and uncertainty in their efforts to achieve food security. I have conducted extended ethnographic research with farmers in Malawi, examining agricultural decision-making. Recently, my collaborative research explored food insecurity and mental health among post-partum women in Malawi and the spread of zoonotic disease due to forest clearing in Panama. In addition to being the chair for the sustainability PhD program, I oversee the Global Master's program in sustainable development practice. From 2016-2025, I designed and led SIT's undergraduate International Honors Program in Food Systems. I have also been involved in teaching agroecology in Malawi through my time as a Peace Corps volunteer and through the Zisinthe Farm and Community Garden, where I serve as a planning partner. Dr. Aly Dagang, Ph.D. completed her BA in international development with an emphasis in Latin American studies at American University in Washington, DC, and her PhD in agroforestry and forest conservation at the University of Florida, Gainesville. Her early research, carried out with smallholder farmers, examined biophysical and socioeconomic aspects of wood and fruit tree repopulation of grazed pastures in central Panama. Since then, her work has branched out to include critical issues such as land use decision making among smallholders, and urban-to-rural migration in the Panamanian context with her most recent publication entitled *Climate transformations: Evolving food security, migration, and alternative livelihood strategies in Panama* in *The Routledge Handbook of Sustainable Diets*. Aly has been the SIT Panama academic director since 2002, the chair for the Sustainable Development Practice Hybrid MA since 2020, and previously served as SIT Study Abroad associate academic dean for Latin America. Aly was a Peace Corps volunteer in the Panamanian province of Panama Oeste, and has worked on projects focused on gender, agroforestry, sustainable agriculture, forestry, and conservation. Finally, Aly is a proud mom and celebrates the brave students who are also parents and working professionals.

Dr. Cátia Magro, Ph.D., completed her doctorate in Environment and Sustainability from NOVA University of Lisbon – School of Science and Technology (FCT-NOVA). A native of Lisbon, Portugal, Cátia is deeply passionate about protecting nature and leveraging technology, which inspired her career path as an environmental engineer. Her research has primarily focused resource management and on technology development, leading to one patent application, 21 Science Citation Index articles, and four book chapters. She is currently the Academic Director of the SIT Portugal program in sustainability and environmental justice, while contributing for a national waste management project addressing and measuring the implications of mass and seasonal tourism in the Algarve region, aiming to develop sustainable and just solutions. Cátia has expanded her impact by serving as a mentor at the HiseedTech association, where she guides teams in transforming their ideas into market-ready products and solutions, helping to bridge the gap between scientific research and real-world applications. Outside her professional endeavors, she finds joy in traveling, spend time near the ocean, and delving into the imaginative worlds of fantasy fiction. Her deep love for storytelling and communication in science inspired her to write a children’s book on women’s empowerment and sustainability, aiming to spark meaningful behavioral change in both young readers and the adults around them. Cátia leads our residency in Portugal.

Dr. J. Richard Walz, Ph.D. is chair of the Climate Change and Global Sustainability MA program at SIT Graduate Institute and academic director of the SIT Study Abroad Tanzania programs. He teaches environmental social science and methodology courses that integrate field studies primarily located in eastern Africa. His research and publications emphasize contemporary and historical topics at the human-environment interface, especially how communities forge social mosaics around resources and how they perceive and utilize landscapes and seascapes in an era of environmental change. His teaching and publications incorporate community-based research and promote independent student field studies on climate, resources, and society where Africa meets the Indian Ocean. He oversees the Zanzibar office and programs or excursions to Pemba and Mafia islands and lead our residency in Zanzibar.

We are also delighted to work with various adjunct faculty each year and more updates about them will be forthcoming soon.

PORTUGAL RESIDENCY

Our summer residency and the course *Perspectives in Sustainability* will run in Lisbon, Portugal from May 26th to June 6th. It will **continue synchronously and asynchronously online during the remainder of the summer semester, after departing Lisbon**. You may also choose to take an elective course in summer 2025, based on your number of transfer credits.

Please arrive in Lisbon (airport code: LIS) on Monday May 26th by 5:00pm. On site staff will assist in coordinating travel from the airport to your lodging once flights are booked and we know your arrival time. All students are required to attend our first cohort gathering and dinner at 7:00pm. Please plan to depart Lisbon on the evening of June 6th or the morning of Saturday, June 7th. Students are asked to check out of their rooms no later than 10:00 a.m. EDT, on June 7th if staying in pre-arranged housing (below).

The cost of this accommodation is 29 Euro per night and is a 10-minute walk to both the SIT Portugal Learning Center and a metro station. Through this group booking, we get competitive rates in a convenient location. It offers private rooms and access to a kitchen. If you prefer to book your own, alternate housing, please let me know by **March 15, 2025**.

RESIDENCY SCHEDULE

Classes begin at 9:00 am each morning and finish at 4:30 pm. There will be a 90-minute lunch break between the morning and afternoon classes. Students will also be involved with immersive field visits, hear from guest speakers, and attend group meetings during what may appear to be unscheduled blocks of time in the final schedule (to be shared closer to start of the residency). Thus, students should not plan to conduct work during their time in Portugal, as free time will be limited.

FAMILY & PARTNERS

SIT Graduate Institute recognizes that, on occasion, students may wish to have a “companion” (defined as an immediate family member, or partner, to include dependent children) accompany them on their residency. It is important to recognize that the academic components require extensive time and energy. Students are expected to engage in every program activity including classes and evening/weekend group meetings. There are long days of classes and rigorous academic assignments. If students would like to discuss bringing family members to the seminar, please consult with me by **March 15, 2025**

WHAT ELSE CAN I EXPECT?

Our second residency is scheduled to take place in Zanzibar, Tanzania, during May/June 2026. Details will be confirmed later in the year.
